Child Care Assistance- Federal


The Child Care & Development Block Grant (CCDBG) is the primary federal grant program that allows states to provide child care assistance to low-income working families with children.



In Arizona, 31% of children age six and under are income-eligible for child care assistance based on federal rules on average each month.




However, 88% of income-eligible children are left with no access to child care assistance due to insufficient state funding.



Child Care Assistance- State

Before the recession, Arizona allocated \$85 million in state General Fund dollars to child care assistance. By 2011, state funding for child care was removed. First Things First stepped in to fulfill the state matching requirements or risk losing federal funding. A waiting list was implemented for child care assistance.

In 2024, Governor Hobbs and the Legislature appropriated \$12 million for child care, but that was less than the \$100 million needed due to the end of the pandemic era funding. As a result, a waiting list was reinstated in August 2024.



By 2010, more than 70% of the state contribution was removed, and the General Fund appropriation was \$24 million. Pandemic era funding was dispersed, which included funding for stabilization grants to child care providers and making child care more affordable for families. Governor Hobbs included \$112.4 million in her FY26 Executive Budget Proposal. The appropriation is only expected to alleviate half of the waiting list.
